In the meantime, we are planning of making the most of the 30 days left of school and enjoying more outdoor activities as we creep towards summer.

Although the weather has been very up and down lately, we were lucky to get a nice day for our school photos on Thursday. For any families that ordered photos, we are hoping to have them delivered in the next three or four weeks.

With the return to school four weeks ago, we've seen the return of increased traffic on Murray Road during drop-off and pick-up times. Unfortunately, we've also seen the return of some irresponsible and dangerous driving close to school. Unsafe and impatient driving leads to frustration and inconvenience for others and affects neighbouring residents on our street. Please show courtesy and patience during peak traffic times at school, especially in the afternoons, as dangerous and illegal driving and parking poses a very significant risk to the safety of our students. U-turns in driveways close to school and double-parking along Murray Road is becoming an increasing concern and is very hazardous driving behaviour. We also have parents crossing the road away from the supervised school crossing which is risky and sets a really poor example to others. I would really appreciate it if parents could obey the road and parking rules and ensure safe and courteous driving near the school.

This is a very important job and our teachers do extensive planning and work incredibly hard to ensure that students are placed in grades that best suit every individual child's learning needs. This includes considering the children that they may work best with in their new grade, students that it may be best to separate them from, which teacher might best cater to their learning needs, the dynamics of student relationships within the grade and any other relevant factors that may have a significant impact on their educational, social and emotional development while at school at Rosewood Downs.

Given that this important work is now underway, I am inviting parents to contact me if you have relevant educational, social or emotional wellbeing concerns that you feel we need to be aware of prior to making a decision on which grade your child may be placed in. We can only consider requests for a particular teacher or student that you would like your child to be in a grade with (or not with) if there is a legitimate basis for the request, as outlined above. Please contact me at school to arrange a meeting if you would like to discuss potential grade placement for your child in 2021. Otherwise, please be assured that we will make grade placement decisions with every student's individual needs and best interests considered as we work towards creating functional and effective class groupings for 2021.
